Fish & Wildlife Management: This team may track a radio collared animal, go electro-fishing, learn how wildlife adapt to their surroundings and complete a habitat enhancement project.

Rangeland Management: This group learns about the “fitness” of the rangeland and the forage it provides.

Soil & Water Conservation: Students learn about the primary components of the watershed. Study river system and learn about different types of soil

Forest Management: Learn about the different forest types, health of forests and how insects, diseases, and fire affect trees.

Second half of the Week.

Students will develop and present their group natural resource action plans. They will use their group plan to complete a management project on the property with the guidance of their professional leaders and end the week with a workday implementing plans.
